
Carol Davidson lived on Kenyon Street in the West End since 1998. She died in January, and her husband, Bruce Robbins will show her watercolors and stained glass.







"My works I describe as 'paint dancing with paint.' While I am not a professional artist and have had no formal training, I can no longer imagine life that does not include my painting. Placing paint on canvas gives me utter joy and allows for whatever it is that may be bottled up inside, and in need of total release, to release. I do not paint, in other words, for outcome, but for process. All I want to do when painting is to experience its direct immediacy.

"I get started with selecting a canvas in blank (often very large), do some meditative breath work, reach then for a tool to apply paint onto canvas, be that a brush, pallet knife or both, examine my paint bucket and feel what it is that speaks to me in that particular moment, then begin, with no particular place to go, other than into the direction that the process takes me.

"And while a viewer's enjoyment of my works is thusly quite incidental to that process, I do hope that you do. I find myself often growing in fond relationship with many of my works, increased as the years move by. Perhaps, too, for you."

"Good design is like breathing for me - a lifetime of looking at objects and activities in a certain way. Does the design work? Does it please the eye? Does it fit in the hand? Is it easy to use? Is it just what you need? My style? Classically beautiful – but unique, nonetheless."

Sponsored by the West End Civic Association, ArtAround grew out of the art walk that was part of WECA's Jane Jacob's Walks in 2010. Richard Florida, professor of regional economic development at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, PA, believes that a community's aesthetic assets, including its artistic communities, are among its most priceless resources and the elements that "make a city sing." One of the threads in the rich fabric of the City of Hartford is its arts and culture, and one of the City's most vibrant artistic communities is the West End, a neighborhood with both a strong sense of place and pride of place.
